



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Professor David Held, Master

I would like to take a moment to reflect on the wonderful work that she did for the College, and her commitment to the students right up until the end of her life. She will be missed and her loss will be greatly felt by all those who knew her (see obituary). She loved Castle, and would want us to continue to thrive.

In this edition, we pause to celebrate the life of an extraordinary role model at College, Vice-Master and Senior Tutor, Eva Schumacher-Reid, who served at Castle from 2008 - 2016.

Prior to joining Castle Eva was a part-time language tutor at St. John's College, 1994-1999; part-time language teacher in the Department of German, 1995-2002, and the German Language Centre 1996-2002; Language Instructor, Department of German, 2002-2004; and Senior Language Instructor, Department of German from 2004 onwards. She was a gifted, creative and resourceful teacher, who gave an enormous amount to, and demanded a great deal from, her students.

Eva's appointment to University College in 2008 focused her energies on student support. Her commitment to students was total and she became well known for her extraordinary energy, care, and attention to each and every person she encountered. She became integral to the College, and built and ran a welfare team which supported students through the years. She leaves a formidable legacy. Eva was an inspiring figure for the students and staff of the College, and she deeply cared about each and every one of them. Her battle with illness over the last six years highlighted her incredible determination and strength of character, which focused on the students until the very end. Her work with welfare and charities meant she had an incredible impact on the students and the College as a whole. Eva will be remembered for many things, including giving some of the most memorable Induction Week talks, and her weekly columns in the Castle Crier. Every week Eva wrote a segment presented through the voice of her dog, Otto. Otto's Observations took on a cult following, addressing the serious problems of the students in their day to day lives at College, presented through the innocent and often confused tone of the College Dog. 'Senior Welfare Dog: Otto Schumacher-Reid. I am a wire-haired Hungarian Viszla, a bit challenged height-wise, but my beautiful brown nose takes some beating. And don't forget my keyboard skills.'

It's been a busy few months for the MCR. The summer was spent laying the foundations for the rest of the year and I'm happy to report that we have a thriving calendar this year, absolutely filled to the brim with a range of social and academic events. We also welcomed our largest intake of new postgraduate students at the start of October, and the MCR is now around 400 strong. This represents a huge increase in graduate students over the last few years, and Castle now has

the largest graduate community outside of Ustinov College. This opens up a variety of new possibilities for the MCR and over the course of this year I will be working closely with the JCR, SCR, and College Office to help the MCR redefine its place in the Castle community.

The Castle Charity Ball, to be held on 28 January 2017, has already sold over 400 tickets and is shaping up to be our best event yet. I couldn't be happier with the uptake and involvement from all three common rooms. We have also booked in the inaugural inter-disciplinary MCR Conference for next summer (26-27 July 2017) and our Academic Officer, Alex Llewelyn, has really hit the ground running. 



Other News in Heritage Silver in Focus



Over 40 people from a wide variety of backgrounds attended the day. These included students, academics, the University College community, museum professionals and volunteers. The day also included in-depth discussions on the nature of the silver and collecting in addition to different cultural traditions relating to silver.



Dr Helen Clifford compiled a report based on her assessment of the collections at University College. In particular, she highlighted the Candelabrum which is used for College Feast as a historically significant item. Helen states that the artefact was unusual among surviving examples of Robert Garrard II London work of the 1840s, as they are in the Rococo style, not the more common rather 'stiff' Victorian 'Rococo Revival' and are clearly a bravura attempt to recapture the asymmetrical fluid style that French designers like Juste-Aurèle Meissonnier (1695-1750) created in the first half of the eighteenth century. Further objects were also identified as being significant and needing additional research.

Work has also been undertaken on improving the collections management of the silver collection. This has been carried out by a mixture of inventorying, photographing, repacking and studying of the silver collection. This process will continue and will allow further curatorial skills to be developed by students and allow for an increased awareness of the collection.





Heritage Internship Sophie Ridley

Satin dress, hair done, and... bright purple nitrile gloves - my preparations for College Feast didn't end with getting dolled up, but with helping to install the magnificent Victorian silver candelabrum. One of the first things I learnt about Durham Castle was that the buildings and collection certainly haven't been static over the years, but are still well used. I am now halfway through my time under the University College Durham Trust Scholarship, which sees me undertake my MA in Museum and Artefact Studies part time alongside part time volunteering in the Castle Museum under Gemma Lewis, the Curator, all kindly funded by the Durham Castle Trust. I have learnt a lot more about Castle (University College) - and the Castle over the last year, but the silver collection is something I keep going back to. It has been the focus of the one of the main projects I have undertaken so far as part of my scholarship: an overhaul of its storage to make an organised, user-friendly, modern (bar the historic safes that remain in use) store for the Castle's silver collection. The visible focal point of this project was the study day, 'Silver in Focus', which saw a conservator, a contemporary

maker, silver experts and more come together in the Senate Room to give a series of talks on silver. However, much of the curatorial side goes on



quietly with very few realising the work that is being carried out on the collection. These are the processes of carefully recording, labelling, photographing and boxing objects. I have also been writing and editing text panels for objects on display, conservation cleaning the Tunstall Chapel and ordering fabric to re-line the museum cases. I helped design a children's trail leaflet for guided tours, jointly set up a Facebook presence for the museum side, and have given talks and stewarded rooms over the summer on the self-guided days. The list goes on, as does our list of projects in the office, and I look forward to another year of combining what I'm learning on the MA into practical curatorial work in and around Castle - my purple nitrile gloves are always at the ready.



A write up of the recent Much Ado About Nothing tour to America, written by Theo Holt-Bailey.

After having sent a tour to New York in 2013, we returned to the States. North Carolina Duke University, this year, encouraged by Peter Warbuton. It was organised by one of our two tour managers, Ellis Anne-Dunmall and last year's CTC president, Kate Barton, with help from Sam Milgarese at Duke Durham and Regional Affairs. They sorted not only our day at the University, but our accommodation with local families as part of the Durham Sister Cities Program, and visits to The Forest at Duke and Durham School of the Arts.

The CTC had been in New York touring the show the week before, but after hopping off the 14 hour Greyhound bus in Raleigh on 14th September we didn't stop. We were driven to The Forest at Duke, a retirement home in Durham NC, where we performed to residents, who loved the show.

On the 15th we went to Duke Campus, toured

their drama facilities (which made all of us very jealous), took part in an improvisation workshop lead by Jaybird O'berski, and performed in the Duke Gardens. The venue was a little bit noisy (2 helicopters, trains and regular busses!) but we had a large crowd, many of them university students who we had met earlier that day, and all enjoyed the show.

On the 16th we did less directly with the university, touring downtown Durham and running a Shakespeare workshop with a group of children from the Durham School of the Arts. This was the last day of our tour, so everyone was exhausted (napping in the Duke Durham and Regional Affairs office!), but our show for the students at Durham School of the Arts was probably the best we ever did, with the audience responding to every line!

This year we're not going quite so big, touring the south of England as we have done for the past thirty years. We're planning on building up funds over the next few years so we can (hopefully!) head back over. Fingers crossed for 2019!

The Crucible, by Arthur Miller

Set in Puritan New England in 1692, 'The Crucible' tells the story of the Salem Witch Trials, which shocked a community; culminating in an attack on the values of society and the perceived evils of witchcraft. Miller's timeless work tells of a society gripped by fear, superstition and malice.

'The Crucible' will be performed with five performances in the third week of Michaelmas Term, in Durham Castle's beautiful and haunting Norman Chapel, on the 30th, 31st of October, 1st, 3rd and 4th of November.

Someone Who'll Watch Over Me, by Frank McGuinness

An Englishman, an Irishman and an American awaken to find that they have been locked up in a cell together in the Middle East as victims of political action. Confused, powerless and hopelessly secluded, the trio find themselves engaged in a constant battle for sanity between themselves as much as their captors. Survival, it seems, is more than just a physical need.

McGuinness' work explores the daily crisis endured by hostages whose strength comes from communication, both subtle and mundane, from humour, wit and faith. A piece that is as absurd as it is harrowing, the play challenges the differences encountered between people based on race, culture, nationality and personality.

The Wasp, by Morgan Lloyd Malcolm

Heather and Carla haven't seen each other since school. Their lives have taken very different paths - Carla lives a hand-to-mouth existence while Heather has a high-flying career, husband and a beautiful home. And yet, here they are in a cafe having tea and making awkward conversation. That is until Heather presents Carla with a bag containing a significant amount of cash and an unexpected proposition.

The Wasp is an electric new thriller exploring how far beyond the playground we carry our childhood experiences and to what lengths some people are willing to go to in order to come to terms with them.

This project can be seen as a further stage in the longer history of the Courtyard's expansion, whose previous developments have been funded through the generosity of alumni.


In the 1983 Castellum, the then-Master, Dr. Salthouse wrote:

My name is Catriona, and it is a true honour to be the President of Castle Community Action (CCA)

this year. Since its inception in 2012 CCA has blossomed thanks to continued support and dedication from University College students and alumni.

Last year we worked hard to make the Castle open and accessible through our new 'Community Day' division. For me, two highlights were when we hosted afternoon tea for students with special educational needs from Durham Trinity School and our Easter Community Day which prompted an email from some Hatfield SCR guests to say what a great event it had been.

Amongst all this, our weekly volunteering is still running well, with a three course Community Meal every Saturday night during term time, while our links with local Primary and Secondary schools are going from strength to strength. Last Easter saw our second annual residential for year 10 pupils, with sessions ranging from basic computer coding to discussions of media representation of the refugee crisis. Over the course of the residential the students were tasked with creating short films that encapsulated 'Durham's Identity' which resulted in a very moving private showing on the last day.

This term we hosted the black tie CCA Auction which is now an annual feature on all Castlemen's social calendars.

Our objectives remain to put Durham Castle back in the heart of the community which we are doing through a series of projects and initiatives such as:

- Increasing access to the Castle on Community Days and one-off events.
- Hosting events for vulnerable and disadvantaged community groups.
- Working with Castle Tours to increase access by helping to fund tour chairs for those less mobile.



- Castle sport teams and societies running workshops in local schools.
- Working with other organisations such as Sanctuary 21 and Auckland Castle to broaden the scope of our outreach.
