









The ongoing work to maintain the Castle's Heritage

Providing and improving access to the incredible history of the Castle, College and collections is at the heart of the heritage activities at Durham Castle and there is always work to be carried out on our historic items and buildings.

This year has seen a increase in access and the use of the collections and the buildings. The saddles in the Tunstall Gallery were the basis of a post-graduate research paper, the visitors on the castle tours were assessed by student placements and the Cromwellian armour featured in the recent *Magna Carta* exhibition at Palace Green Library. The student experience is also important and volunteers, interns and placements are contributing to the care of heritage in Durham Castle. The College and University actively supports the work we are carrying out. The University College's Research & Scholarly Activities Grant enabled us to purchase a camera for documenting the collections. College provided 4 months of



accommodation over the summer for Verena Manfroi from University of Udine, who was studying for a Master's degree in Art History. Over the 4 months Verena was involved with collections work, conservation of military leather objects and developing the visitor experience for those on Castle Tours.

Another recent change took place in October last year, when Sophie Ridley joined University College. Sophie was awarded a new scholarship in memory of Lt-Col Angus Alexander Macfarlane-Grieve. The aim of the scholarship is to allow a student to study on the MA in Museum and Artefacts Studies course part-time over the next two years while having the opportunity to work with the collections and get involved with life at University College. Since starting in October, Sophie has been involved with documenting recent donations, cleaning the brass and the wooden panelling in the Tunstall Chapel, dusting the paintings in the Great Hall, transcribing and developing a children's trail and foreign language guide. Her next project will be involved with repacking, researching and cataloguing the silver store.



Halfway Hall: Hogwarts comes to Durham




Owengate Refurbishment

Last term the Owengate refurbishment was completed and Castle students were able to move into their new accommodation.

The work which lasted much of the summer including structural improvements to the old buildings to make sure they were stable and well maintained. Work then continued on the bedrooms, common room and connecting corridors and staircases to ensure the block is now one of the most up-to-date parts of the Castle accommodation.

The common room has undergone a major refit with new appliances, worktops and furniture. New doors have been fitted to all rooms and the outsides of the buildings, which not only has improved the appearance but also the security of the block. New windows were also fitted which are in keeping with the university guidelines on “green living” and should make the heating of the building much more efficient. Finally, improvements were made to the shower rooms and bathrooms to make these as modern as possible.

The refurbishment has left 35 new rooms (of which 20 are shared) greatly improved compared to their original condition. The block, which has always been a popular location, will continue to be one of the most sought after accommodation blocks outside of the Castle walls.



Castle Community Action

Founded in 2012, CCA is a student-led outreach programme based in University College. CCA aims to integrate University College students into the local community by providing additional support and education to vulnerable sectors of the local area, and by increasing community access to Durham Castle



We see our community engagement not just as volunteering, but as a daily process through which students and other members of the Durham community establish lasting and reciprocal relationships. As a small organisation, we maintain flexibility and are able to tailor our projects to the specific needs of individual beneficiaries. We believe it is vitally important for students to not forget that they are guests of the local community when they attend university. That is why we seek to give back to the local community and connect the Castle to Durham residents.

We have five divisions which run 10 projects within Durham. These cover: Primary Education, Secondary Education, Elderly Care and Connections, Adult Offenders, and Homelessness.

Our current weekly projects currently include:

- Primary Education Bright Sparks Club
- Primary Education Latin Club
- Sixth Form Tutoring
- St. Margaret's Church Coffee Mornings for the elderly.
- Durham History Project
- Durham Prison Visitor Centre Assistance
- Durham Prison Homework Club
- Sanctuary 21 Café for the homeless
- Community Meal also for the homeless.

Hopefully we will be adding to this in the future.



As well as going out into the community we hold a range of events based within the Castle walls during the year. These have included:

- Durham Guides visits: In November, two groups of Durham Guides visited the Castle to work towards their King Arthur badge
- Christmas Tea and Crafts with Durham Trinity students: Last December, families from Durham Trinity joined us for a day of cookie decorating and craft-making, accompanied by live carols, a brass band and rounded off by afternoon tea in the Great Hall.
- A Castle Easter Egg Hunt aimed at Primary school pupils in the local area which happened on the 25th March.

We also have a large range of upcoming events. These include:

- A Performing Arts Workshop covering a wide range of music and drama activities.
- A Spring Residential: Identity and Community in the Information Age
- A Summer Fete which is our major summer event and will this year happen on 26 June.

CCA is deeply committed to access to the Castle, to education and to providing social welfare. All of our projects and events are free of charge for participants which is something we are extremely proud of. We are a fully charitable organisation and our financing comes from fundraising and College support. This year, to further raise funds we ran an extremely successful Charity Black Tie Auction which was made possible by a huge amount of prize donations from local businesses, current students and alumni. The night raised in excess of £2000 for CCA and has put the scheme in a stable financial position for the foreseeable future.

Dickensian star

Those of you have been watching the BBC's production of *Dickensian* may have spotted former Castleman Ben Starr. Graduating in 2010, Ben has been involved in several BBC productions including *Father Brown*, *Doctors* and *The Musketeers* before being cast in the role of Captain James Hawdon. *Dickensian* has seen viewing figures as high as 6 million people and marks a major success for Ben.

We wish him all the best for the future and hope to see him in many more productions for the BBC.



40 Years in Africa

The College would like to give a mention to John Ashworth who recently got in touch to let us know about his work in Africa over the past decades.

After leaving Castle in 1975 with a BSc in physics and an honourable mention in Castle-climbing and Newcastle Brown, John went to Idi Amin's Uganda as a volunteer science teacher. In 1983 he went to Sudan to work first for the Catholic Church and later for the Ecumenical Church Network. He has continued to work in Sudan and, since its independence in 2011, South Sudan, through two civil wars, in various fields including education, humanitarian aid,

development, peacebuilding and reconciliation.

His current work includes supporting the South Sudan Council of Churches' peace and reconciliation initiative to bring peace and healing after the latest civil war, and supporting Holy Trinity Peace Village, an outstanding example of local peacebuilding in one of the remotest parts of South Sudan. His latest book, *The Voice of the Voiceless* (Paulines Publications Africa, 2014), describes the role that the church played during the 1983-2005 civil war in Sudan.

Engineering award

A Castle graduate has been recognised internationally for engineering excellence after winning a prestigious award from the Institution of Civil Engineers (ICE).

Paul Chambers (3rd from the left) who studied MEng Civil Engineering and graduated in 2015, was awarded the Emerging Engineers Award, which also includes a cash prize of £1,500, for his report on London's Paddington Station. Paul's paper, which was titled 'Investigation and Analysis of Temporary Propping at Crossrail Paddington Station',

detailed the link between technical standards and the delivery of major infrastructure projects. Congratulations to Paul.



Floreat Castellum Boat Club

The alumni club which supports UCBC has had a busy and very enjoyable year. There are now 82 members in the club spanning graduates from 1952 to the most recent year group with representatives from each year group from 1997 onwards.

Since the last report the club has raced UCBC both on the Boat Race course at Christmas in a mixed crew (a small loss) and at Durham Regatta against the Women's 1st VIII's. The Men's crew did not race this year due to limited numbers.

Fortunately the club is luckier at socialising and raising much needed funds for UCBC, both of which go from strength to strength. The annual Blazer Black Tie dinner in London saw 23 of FCBC and UCBC's finest converge for a very enjoyable evening. FCBC learned more about UCBC's trip to Amsterdam, and UCBC got to put faces to names and donations and see there is life after graduation. There was also a healthy turnout at the summer drinks at Henley Royal Regatta which this year also saw a new blazer commissioned by Robert Brownell - a more faithful representation of the original Castle colours blazer and now uses the original Castle crest from the 1940s.



The fund is now at its largest level since creation in 2002, with standing orders also coming in quicker than ever before. This fantastic state of affairs has helped FCBC make significant contributions to putting UCBC's fleet some way back to its former glory. FCBC contributed in 2011 to the new Janousec VIII "Maurice Tucker" and in 2014 to the new Stampfli IV+ "FCBC". The next contribution will be in 2017 - we aim to make a donation during each student's time at UCBC.

This generosity however does need increased members joining each year - would you or someone you know be interested in joining FCBC?

We have a huge amount of alumni based in the south West so we are hoping for an excellent turnout.


